

The Gun emplacements were started in 1898 and completed in 1899. In one Document the price list for one Gun emplacement was for a total of \$50,000. This was for the cement structure, ladders, brass tubes for communication and the fill. An item on the list was for sand fill at .25 cents a cubic yard delivered. Today construction sand is \$36.70 a cubic yard. The one gun emplacement required 6000 cubic yards of sand.

The above is a picture of one gun emplacement as seen in the History Center diorama. It is an exact replica in dimensions and internal rooms. There is a separate model with a cut away of all the rooms along with identifying tags. The Model required over 200 hours of research and development. However we can recognize the sources of the material: Lowes, Michaels, Grayco, and Home Depot. Total cost of material was \$500 for the 3 gun emplacements. The modeler, Dennis Cannady constructed the model pro bono.

Some interesting statistics. More than 800 visitors from 26 states toured Fort Fremont in Jan. and Feb. FFF gave group tours to the Dataw and Oldfield communities, and put on a special program for 60 students and teachers from the Lowcounty Montesorri School. THE SOLDIERS OF FORT FRÉMONT

1st Lt. JOHNSON HAGOOD, Commander, Fort Fremont 1998-1901

Johnson Hagood (pronounced "haig'-wood"), was all of 25 years old and the first commanding officer of Fort Fremont when he arrived there in November, 1899. Hagood was born in Orangeburg, SC, on June 16, 1873 and was an 1891 graduate of the University of South Carolina. In 1896 he graduated from the U.S. Military Academy and was commissioned a 2nd Lt. in the Artillery.

He is perhaps the most noteworthy of all Fort Frémont's commanding officers. Hagood was the nephew of Confederate Brigadier General Johnson Hagood who commanded the troops at Fort Wagner during the attack by the all-black 54th Massachusetts Infantry (as depicted in the movie *Glory*) and served as Governor of South Carolina from 1880–1882.

First Lt. Hagood served as commanding officer at Fort Frémont until 1901 after previous garrison service at Fort Trumbull, CT, Rhode Island, Sullivan's Island, SC and Fort Monroe, VA. At Fort Frémont, Hagood commanded 25 enlisted soldiers comprising Battery "B" and "M" of the 1st Artillery and Battery "E" of the 2nd Artillery. Now a captain, Hagood then served as an instructor of philosophy at West Point from 1901-04. In 1905, Hagood became assistant to the Chief of Artillery, Washington, DC and then served on the General Staff Corps. Around 1906, Hagood married Jane Gordon Small and they ultimately had 4 children together, including Johnson Hagood, Jr who graduated from the US Military Academy in 1931 and commanded a Regiment of Heavy Artillery with distinction in Africa, Italy and France during World War II.

Johnson Hagood retired in 1936 at the rank of Major General. On December 22, 1948 Hagood died in Chicago at the age of 75 and was interred at the Magnolia Cemetery, Charleston, SC. His wife Jean outlived him by 19 years.

With a handful of reference sources in the 1960's from GG Dowling, former owner of FF, Carl and Cecile advanced to the National Archives to begin the history quest. The research and preservation of the hospital and the Fort have been a mission of the family and their daughters and now, grandchildren.

Cecile is an active member of the Board. Past President, and as a volunteer she expresses the joy in sharing "The History Mystery" (baseball shoe) with the school groups and visitors at the Fort.
