Homeland Defense at the Turn of the 20th Century

The Control Tower was the operational brains of the Fort's defense. It contained the Staff and Advanced technology to track and fire on enemy incursions into Port Royal Sound.

The Fire Control Tower (Part 1)

The fire control tower consisted of two observation levels at the top of a steel structure. In the larger lower level were mounted two azimuth tracking sights (M1910 A1) (one is on exhibit in the History Center) and in the central upper level was a depression position finding (D.P.F.) sight. The latter sight, operated by an observer and a reader, was the basis for tracking a target vessel from a single fire control tower. The D.P.F. sight was mounted at the top of a 3 ft. diameter steel column filled with concrete that was anchored to an 8 ft. deep by 7 ft. diameter concrete base. The tower itself was on a 24 ft. square and 4 ft. deep concrete base. This was to ensure a very stable platform for the critical fire control measurements.

The 46 ft. high Fort Fremont fire control tower was also the location for the fort's Fire Commander who oversaw the fort's two batteries and at times the 10 in. gun Battery Jesup's Battery Commander. They, with their observers, sight readers, and several telephone operators occupied the tower's larger lower level. The lower level could hold held a total of about 10 personnel.

The operations in the Fire Control Tower to engage a target vessel will be covered in later issues.

The Fort Fremont diorama was created by Master Modeler, Dennis Cannady, to depict the fort as it was in 1900. The Friends raised funds by offering the community to sponsor a building. Marian and Ray Rollings sponsored the fire control tower in honor of Col. and Mrs. James Bradin, a retired artillery officer and early member of the Friends.

BLACK MASONS TOUR FORT FRÉMONT

Robert Smalls is well known in US history, having been a hero of the Civil War and later becoming a politician; he won election as a Republican to the South Carolina Legislature and to the United States House of Representatives during the Reconstruction era. He was also a Prince Hall Mason and a member of the local Sons of Beaufort Lodge #36 (African-American Freemasons).

On December 14, 1905 former congressman Smalls asked First Lt. John O. Steger of Fort Fremont if he would permit a local delegation of black Masons to inspect the fortifications. Lt. Steger, the commanding officer of Fort Fremont and an 1898 Virginia Military Institute (VMI) graduate, replied "It would be neither pleasant nor to the interest of the service to grant the request and your request is denied" (Austin-American Statesman, 1905, et al.). Smalls then telegraphed Secretary of War William Howard Taft to see if he would approve his request. Taft would be elected President of the United States just three years later and in 1921 would become Chief Justice of the US Supreme Court (Wikipedia, 2024).

As soon as the matter was called to his attention, Taft promptly sent a telegraphic order stating that "all should be admitted who desire to visit the historic fort" (Buffalo Evening News, 1905 et al.). Taft further replied "I will not stand for any foolishness or unnecessary red tape on the part of [my] subordinates in the Army because of race or color (Buffalo Evening News, 1905 et al.). Some several hundred Black Masons accordingly descended on Fort Fremont that very afternoon and received a tour. The incident made national news. Despite Lt. John Steger's early career misjudgment in the matter, he would continue as commanding officer through September 1906 and would go on to have a long and distinguished military career.
